2020 Plattsburgh Public Library Budget Narrative

1. Analyze the positives and negatives of implementing the 2019 budget.

Despite cuts to several budget lines, we were able to maintain a high level of service and material offerings to our patrons. We increased our programming and lending, and welcomed many new community groups and residents to the library.

Seventy percent of our borrowers are city residents. The remaining thirty percent are members of the Clinton- Essex-Franklin Library System and are granted borrowing privileges due to our status as the Central Library of the system. We received \$92,380 from NY State Library in 2018 for this work.

In 2018 we circulated 116,653 items (7,716 of which were electronic resources) which is an overall increase of 5,056 over 2017. Another 14,263 items were used in house.

Our Children's collection circulation increased from 30,989 in 2017 to 38,425 in 2018. Over 900 children registered for the Summer Reading Program this year. We removed overdue fines on Children's materials in 2019 which will result in a decrease in revenue of approximately \$1,500. However we felt strongly that the fines served as a barrier to free and open access to literacy opportunities for community children and their families. The response has been very positive.

We had 101,303 visitors to the library in 2018, and 14,263 public computer sessions.

Our allocation from the city was \$811,000 in 2015. In 2016 it was cut to \$751,458 where it has remained since then. That is four years of increasing costs and flat funding. We have researched other funding sources such as a special library tax district, but that is not available at this time.

2. Compare the 2019 budget to the Mayor's Budget for 2020

a. What are the increases and decreases in general operational expenditures/revenue (if applicable)?

b. Explain the impact of each of the above on operations/services. How will these changes affect your department's ability to carry out operations/provide services?

The continued rise in benefit costs within a flat budget will force us to make cuts to lines that will eventually affect services.

c. Analyze personnel/ payroll increases or decreases as they impact the budget and departmental services.

Overall, our Employee Base Pay Analysis is lower than in 2012 when it was \$505,816.

Overtime is budgeted at \$4842 for 2019, and is well within this amount.

We are currently negotiating the AFSCME Union contract which expired July 1, 2019.

Our staffing is unchanged, but several employees will be receiving longevity increases next year.

PROPOSED 2020 BUILDING INSPECTOR BUDGET NARRATIVE

Positives and Negatives

Positives:

- Reduced budget by 5.8%
- 5.8% reduction will not impact services.

Negatives:

- Did not increase vehicle maintenance/repairs line items, but with 2 of our vehicles more than 10 years old, we could run in to repair type issues which would be common with these older vehicle.
- Postage is up \$400
- Training is up \$500.00

Comparison of 2019 Budget to 2020 Budget

- A) Increases/Decreases in Expenditure:
- Overall budget is down 5.8%. This is mainly due to no separation pay in next year's budget.
- Regular pay is down .7% from the 2019 budget due to the new Municipal Code Inspector who recently replaced the inspector who retired earlier this year.
- Overtime is shown to be up by 11.9%, but is the same amount as was requested for 2019.
- Postage is up \$400.00. This is due to the revised snow law that requires our office to mail out all notices certified.
- Training is up \$500.00 to cover the cost of our new inspector finishing his certification.
- B) Impact:
- Changes will not impact our ability to provide services.
- C) Personnel/Payroll:
- Personnel payroll is down .7% due to the replacement of a senior inspector.

DESTINATION "OLD BASE MUSEUM CAMPUS"

30 March 2018 Updated 5 April 2018 (Pages 3-5)

PURPOSE:

Develop and promote the OBMC as a destination. The Old Base is a hidden gem and an important part of the rich history of our region.

INTRODUCTION: (Reason to make a destination)

The OBMC affords the residents of and visitors to Clinton County and the North County a taste of our rich history from Samuel de Champlain, the Revolutionary War, the Battle of Plattsburgh and the Plattsburgh Air Force Base and all the other facets that have supported the residents and economy from making automobiles, mining for iron, farming, arts & music, etc.

The number and quality of attractions (as listed below) on the Old Base far exceeds any other area in the City and the County. If properly marketed, the area would attract tourists in a wide variety of ways – biking, walking, sightseeing, museums, tours, child friendly spaces, eating, and picnicking. Events such as concerts, foot races, and local celebrations could be easily managed with the availability of large amounts of land. Parking is plentiful.

The Museums on the Base are members of the ACCA (Adirondack Coast Cultural Alliance) formed many years ago to represent the cultural entities in Clinton County.

There are some grants/opportunities already in place that we feel would be a great asset not only to the OBMC but to the entire region:

- The Plattsburgh Regional Heritage Sites Preservation Plan (aka the 2016 Battlefield Project Grant) was awarded to the City in 2016. This grant is to develop a Comprehensive Plan for the City of Plattsburgh's Historic Battlefield Sites namely Forts Brown, Scott and Moreau, Valcour Island, Crab Island and Plattsburgh Bay. The City, so we've been told, is working with the Lake Champlain Maritime Museum on this project.
- Grant money awarded in 2016 to the City by the County (Tobacco Settlement Fund) for signage directing residents and tourists to the Old Base Museum Campus and as of this date has not been used. CCHA did all the research, worked with the other Museums, presented a Power Point program to the City and others, and worked with Janet Kennedy who wrote the application.
- The Saranac River Trail Grant We are hopeful that a bridge will be built over the Saranac River near the site of Fort Brown on U.S. Avenue and connect to the Terry Gordon Bike Path which will hopefully connect to the new Historic Crab Island Vista Park proposed by the Town of Plattsburgh and the County American Legion.

On 4 July 2026, the 250th Anniversary of the United States will be celebrated. America250, which is being spearheaded by the National DAR, will be a huge event and one which the OBMC, the City, the Town, the County and the whole region must be a significant part of!

Tourism is a huge industry and we believe that with the right collaboration and marketing, the Old Base Museum Campus will be an important asset to the whole region.
